Vice District Governor Lion Ken's Comments

Ohio Plan Topics #2 (continued from July)

Here are some of the most important items that need to be considered when recruiting new Lions.

Gathering Names: Some Club members are reluctant to suggest people as prospective members. This is often because they don't want to be placed in the position of having to call the person and ask them to attend a meeting or (horrors of horrors) join the Lions. The solution is to promise these people that if they provide a name(s) they won't personally have to make the call. Someone else will do that job. With this assurance the names will usually flow readily.

Cold Calls: Few people actually enjoy making cold calls. Fortunately it is easy to warm things up a bit before the phone is lifted off the hook. Send each prospect a nice letter of introduction and an advertising flier about your club and the Lions. That way when the phone call arrives it won't be totally cold.

Creating Orphans: Do you want to know the quickest way to get rid of a prospective member? Invite them to a meeting, and when they arrive make sure they stand around in the corner with nobody to talk too. That works every time.....

Booooooooooooooring! You might think a prospective member will care a lot about all the great things Lions do around the world, but you would be wrong. What they really want to know about is what your club is doing to improve your hometown. There is a balance you want to strike. Talk a lot about your local community service efforts (20-25 min), a little about how you raise your money (5-8 min), and a little about Lions worldwide activities (5-8 min). Then ask for question.

If you have to conduct any business at the meeting make it quick, and don't discuss anything controversial. Finally, don't invite a guest speaker who wants to conduct a filibuster (this definitely also includes long-winded District Officers).

Close the Sale: Any salesman will tell you that in order to sell anything to anybody you have to ask for the order. It's amazing how many Lions Clubs spend time and money to get prospects to a meeting and then never ask them to join. After you've wined and dined them, the guests will expect you to ask them to sign up. Some won't immediately join, but it's a good bet that if you don't ask many of them will feel you don't really want them. So get to it!

Wrap-up: They are many other things involved in recruiting new

The Cleveland Scrappers placed fifth at the 2005 World Series of Beep Baseball in Houston, TX the week of July 25-30, 2005. The Scrappers were awarded the Sportsmanship Award and Lion Jeff Dell of the CSU Branch Club of the Broadview Hts. Lions made the Tournament All Star Team for defense. The Taiwan Home Run team defended their Title by defeating the Kansas All Stars 9 to 8 in a rematch from 2004. The Chicago Comets A team placed third, followed by Taichung County (Taiwan) and then the Scrappers.

The work of Broadview Hts. Lion member Lion Bill Zaker was on display at the World Series. Lion Bill has been assisting the NBBA Equipment Committee in conjunction with the Midland Michigan Rotary Club on the development of wireless buzzing bases. Lion Bill's prototype was demonstrated during the week in Houston and the feedback from players, coaches and volunteers was very positive. The Broadview Hts. Lions contributed \$500.00 for the project. Wireless bases will make the sport safer by eliminating the need of having wires draped out along the perimeter of the playing field which both blind and sighted people tend to trip on quite often during beep baseball games. Also, the time to set up a ball field for beep baseball is cut down a great deal. The entire NBBA Board of Directors and many of the members of the National Beep Baseball Association deeply appreciate the work of the Broadview Hts. Lions and Lion Bill Zaker on this project.

We re on deck. The 2006 NBBA World Series of Beep Baseball returns to our District from July 30 through August 5, 2006. Fellow Lions please mark you calendars. The games will once again be at the Ehrnfeldt Soccer Complex in Strongsville and the teams will be housed at the Strongsville Holiday Inn on Royalton Rd (RT 82).

The NBBA membership was so pleased with the 2001 World Series they wanted to come back. The Lions of District 13 C were a big part of that success in

A message from LCIF

Chairperson Clement Kusiak

Despite suffering damage to their own homes and communities, Lions in the states devastated by Hurricane Katrina are reaching out to those most in need. Lions are responding to the tragedy with an untold number of service hours and with great concern and compassion.

I also am pleased to tell you that donations for Hurricane Katrina relief are eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) recognition. LCIF's normal policy is that MJF recognition is not allowed for designated donations. To encourage donations for Katrina victims, the LCIF Board of Trustees amended this policy. Donations sent to LCIF for Hurricane Katrina relief from Aug. 29 to Nov. 30, 2005 (postmarked by Nov. 30), are eligible for MJF recognition. To count toward an MJF, the donation must be a single US\$1,000 payment from a donor. The Melvin Jones Fellow does not have to be named when the donation is made. Reports are coming in almost hourly to LCIF on the relief efforts of Lions. Following is the latest summary of how Lions and LCIF are helping hurricane victims:

Lions/LCIF Aid Katrina Victims

Lions in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida are staffing

shelters and collecting funds, food and supplies for Hurricane Katrina victims, and LCIF is mobilizing support and providing funding for Lions on the ground in the affected areas. Lions from around the United States and as far away as Germany and Thailand are donating money to LCIF.

LCIF awarded a US\$200,000 Major Catastrophe Grant within days of the disaster. LCIF is focusing its short-term relief in three areas: 1.) providing shelters with unmet substantial needs such as food, clothing, personal hygiene items and bedding, 2.) offering health services such as eyeglass distribution, and 3.) meeting needs of Lions camps and facilities housing victims of the disaster.

LCIF also has awarded seven US\$10,000 Emergency Grants for Lions in the affected areas to issue vouchers for food, water and clothing to hurricane victims.

LCIF Chairperson Clement Kusiak has appointed a steering committee of four leading Lions from the four states most affected by the tragedy to serve as liaisons between LCIF, Lions in the disaster areas and Lions who want to help.

LCIF will soon set up a special Web site (www.lions-katrina.org) on Lions' hurricane relief effort. The site will include a Web-based Help Link to connect Lions who want to volunteer time or donate goods with Lions in the affected areas who are

staffing shelters or otherwise helping victims.

Lions in heavily damaged Districts 8-S and 8-N in Louisiana evacuated their homes as did the general population. Louisiana Lions in 8-L, several hours north of New Orleans and generally not directly touched by the disaster, are helping to take care of thousands of displaced people who left New Orleans and other places before the hurricane hit.

"I've never seen anything like this in my life and I never want to see it again," said District Governor Ann Sanders of 8-L. "People came here with only the clothes on their back. We have babies who need diapers and food."

Lions in her district have quickly collected at least several thousand dollars so far to assist the refugees, said Sanders. Lions from Connecticut, Massachusetts and Maine have called her to offer help. The Lion from Maine who called is coordinating a shipment of two 18-wheelers of supplies. A Lion from Lafayette, La., is driving over with a car full of meat.

Lions are assisting at improvised non-Red Cross-shelters that have sprung up. Lions also are helping out at larger venues such as the gym at Louisiana State University in Shreveport, which is holding some 2,000 displaced people.

TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY CAMPAIGN

Dear Fellow Lions of Multiple District 13:

This year your Ohio Lions Foundation will be celebrating the twentieth anniversary of its founding on December 6, 1985. As a Lions Club member of Multiple District 13, you are automatically a member of the Ohio Lions Foundation. Your generous support over the last twenty years has enabled the Foundation to make significant grants totaling **in excess of \$900,000** in the following areas:

- **Disaster Relief Grants:** The Foundation is proud of its record of responding quickly with disaster relief grants for food, clothing, blankets, temporary shelter, home heating fuel, medical expenses, eyeglasses and sanitation supplies for victims of floods, tornados, ice storms, fires, and other disasters striking Ohio communities. Since the Foundation's founding more than **\$116,000** has been awarded in disaster relief grants throughout Ohio.

- **Ohio Lions Foundation - Helen Keller Scholarship Program:** Scholarships are awarded annually in the amount of \$2,750 each, on the basis of financial need and academic ability, to visually impaired Ohio students enrolled as full time students in either undergraduate, graduate or professional degree programs at any of the six participating state supported universities: The Ohio State University, Ohio University, Bowling Green State University, Cleveland State University, Wright State University, and Youngstown State University. The *OLF Helen Keller Scholarship Program* is one of the very few scholarship programs available for visually impaired students pursuing post-graduate courses of study. A total of ten scholarships will be awarded for the 2004-2005 academic year. To date, **over \$289,000** in Helen Keller Scholarships have been awarded to students in nearly every academic field of study, including nursing, education, rehabilitation, physical therapy, electrical engineering, finance, mathematics, computer / information science, music, law, and veterinary medicine.

- **Matching Grant Program for Low-Vision Readers / Video Magnifier Devices for Public Libraries and Senior Centers:** In May, 2002, the Ohio Lions Foundation initiated a new matching grant program with the goal of placing low vision readers / video magnifier devices in public libraries throughout Ohio. Lions Clubs may apply for matching grants of up to \$1,500 each toward the cost of acquiring qualified low-vision readers to be placed in local public libraries. A plaque is placed on each unit acknowledging that the unit was a gift of the Lions of Multiple District 13

Twentieth Annual Campaign local Lions Club and the Foundation. Last year the program was expanded to include low vision readers to be placed in community-based public senior citizen centers as well as in public libraries. To date a total of 50 low vision reader matching grants have been awarded in the total amount of approximately **\$56,000**.

- **Capital Grants and Matching Grants:** In addition to the low vision reader matching grant program, over the last twenty years, the OLF has awarded capital and program grants in excess of **\$195,000** to various

educational, sight-related organizations and other charitable organizations for various items of adaptive equipment and specific sight-related programs.

• **Advised Restricted Fund Grants:** The OLF also serves as trustee for numerous advised restricted funds. Grants from those funds have been awarded (in excess of **\$245,000**) for such projects as individual eye exams and eyeglasses for needy individuals, maintenance of the Lions Sensory Garden at the Ohio State School for the Blind, individual sight and hearing cases, grants to schools for youth projects, and support of various other sight-related organizations. **Your continued support is needed** so that your Foundation's programs can be maintained and expanded. The Ohio Lions Foundation is a Section 501(c)(3) charitable organization and therefore contributions, gifts and bequests from individual Lions members, friends of the Lions and community businesses, and other foundations are tax deductible. Transmittal forms with instructions are enclosed for making unrestricted individual and club contributions to the Annual Campaign (blue form) and for making designated gifts such as memorial gifts and gifts to the *Ohio Lions Foundation Helen Keller Scholarship Fund* (gold form). For your convenience, a properly addressed return envelope is also enclosed. Your trustees thank you in advance for your continued support of your Ohio Lions Foundation.
