An Inspiring Lion

The Lions of Stow that recently merged with the Monroe Falls club have an asset in their corner. Lion Bob Platt is that hidden asset and has been the club secretary for most of his life in Lions. Involving himself in every project the club has taken on since his start in Lions.

Lion Bob, in 1958, first learned of Lions by receiving the "StoLion Award" for citizenship at his school presented by the Stow Lions in the first year it was presented. Now Lion Bob is the presenter of that award which ranges from Kindergarten through the 12th grade levels, with 12 schools to cover. He used to take the day off of work to present these awards to kids so deserving.

As far as deserving kids are concerned Lion Bob found it necessary to personally help find a place this year for a Christmas Party for Downs Syndrome Kids in the City of Stow. The support group for these kids would have been charged for a place to have a Christmas Party but Lion Bob thought the Stow Lions could help. The Lions have a great reputation with the City and found them a park facility for free due to Lion Bob's persistence. He even made all the arrangements for his club to host the party. This hits very close to home for Lion Bob because his

brother's child has Downs Syndrome.

Greatly involved with the City of Stow Lion Bob personally takes care of the "Adapt-a-Spot" for the Lions Club. "Adapt-a Spot" is a plot of land at city hall that is beautified with flowers that needs tending too. Lion Bob is responsible for looking after weeding of this area to keep it neat. The plot, right in front of City Hall has looked wonderful for years with the help of Lion Bob.

King Lion Bruce Rowland described Lion Bob as "easy going, willing and available, and just try to keep him out of anything". His involvement even with his own club members includes transporting Lion Michelle Hasenstaub, a sightless Lion, to work every now and then. Lion Michelle had a Seeing Eye dog that was ready for retirement that she received from New York before moving to Stow. When Lion Michelle was ready for a new dog she thought it best to seek the New York services that was until King Lion Bruce and Lion Bob explained about our Pilot Dog program. With the recommendations of the club they referred her to Columbus to provide her with a new dog. Lion Bob and King Lion Bruce even drove her to Columbus for training

and to receive her new seeing eye dog. Some of Lion Bob's projects include being on the planning committee for the Lions Night-at-the Races, and their annual Lions Flea Market to which he is responsible for ticket sales. Lion Bob started the tradition that if you didn't have the \$1.00 entry fee for the flea market, then a pair of old glasses could still get you in. The Lions Flea Market has now become an institution in the City of Stow. For the last 41 years Lion Bob, with the help of the rest of the club, have raised \$2,000 to \$3,000 and 200 to 300 pairs of glasses each year.

As involved with the Stow-Munroe Falls Lions as Lion Bob is he still finds time to be a husband to Barb, raise his daughter Beth, umpire softball for the City of Stow, bowl, and golf. Yet Lion Bob thought, since his retirement just last year that he wasn't doing enough for the community so he has taken on bike patrol for the Metro Parks. Keeping him involved with the community.

You might have even seen Lion Bob running a booth for his club at one of the District Conventions. He is usually there. It is his involvement and dedication to the Stow-Munroe Falls Lions that Lion Bob Platt is known. Starting with an award for citizenship and today taking on a role in all the Stow-Munroe Falls Lions club projects no matter how large or small, that makes Lion Bob Platt truly an inspiring Lion.

LIONS 101

WHAT IS A MULTIPLE DISTRICT AND HOW DOES OUR CLUB FIT IN?

Districts: All Lions clubs are part of a district, which is usually comprised of at least 35 clubs that have a combined total of at least 1,250 members. The District Governor serves as the chief administrative officer for the district. He or she is elected at the district convention to serve a one-year term.

My club is in MD13C. WHAT DOES MD 13C MEAN?

Multiple Districts: When a district becomes too large, it may be subdivided along geographical lines to form two or more sub-districts. Ohio is Multiple District 13; there are 10 sub-districts in Ohio designated A through K (I is not used). The northeast portion of Ohio consisting of the following counties: Ashtabula, Lake, Gauge, Cuyahoga, Summit and Medina comprise our District 13C. District 13C currently has 1,340 members in

45 Lions clubs plus the Cleveland State Branch Club, two Leo clubs and two Lioness clubs.

Per the International Constitution, the 10 District Governors within our multiple district (Ohio MD 13) constitute the Council of Governors, which usually meet four times a year to supervise the administration of the affairs of MD 13. The organizational framework of Lions International promotes the dispensing of information from the International Directors to the District Governors through the multiple district's Council of Governors meetings. Following each Council of Governors meetings, each District Governor holds a district meeting (cabinet meeting). Information then filters through the District Governor to the district cabinet and zone chairmen and then on to each individual club and member. In District 13C any Lion is welcome to attend the district cabinet and/or zone meeting; ask your club president when the next one is scheduled.

My club is in a ZONE too? I'm ready to "zone out!" **WHAT'S MY ZONE?**

Our district, 13C, is divided into six zones each with a zone chairman appointed by the District Governor. As you can see from the list below, the clubs in each zone are relatively close together geographically. The zone chairs are the contact people between the District Governor and each club. If and when you want to become more involved in Lions beyond your own club, being a zone chairman is a good place to start. Talk to your current zone chairman about your interest.

“District 13-C Lions Information Center” Sight & Hearing

When asked by Governor Carol Lester to tell about Pilot Dogs, I thought about all the facts and figures but I decided to talk about the personal side, with all the experiences I've had with Pilot Dogs.

The most impressionable experience was when I was blindfolded and led around the block in downtown Columbus by a Pilot Dog. It was scary to not be able to see, my sense of balance was off and I had to put my trust in a

dog for my safety and well-being. After about 20 feet I realized that the dog knew what it was doing, stopping at curbs and uneven sidewalk, even negotiating tree limbs and debris on the sidewalk. I was along for the ride.

I've talked to many blind persons with pilot dogs and they have told me about being on a bus and the dog knows when their stop is coming. They tell how when the harness is put on, the dog goes from a pet to a work dog and not much will distract the dog from its mission to serve it's master. Just like the Lions "we serve."

So impressed by these dogs ability, I asked if I could do something and immediately was told that a litter of red Doberman's was available and they needed puppy raisers. Well, our puppy was Apache and naturally was the "best dog in the world." That title lasted until he got home and lived up to his name and a few others. But over time, he went from a puppy to an adolescent teenager. Apache went for his necessary beginning training. The standard sit, down and heel. When Apache was with the other dogs in training there was a certain air of distinction about him, as if he knew he was not going to be a house pet. Apache took his training to earnest and became very well mannered to a point, still the puppy.

Time came to pass when Apache was recalled by Pilot Dogs to continue his training. Sad to see him go, we took him for the last trip to Columbus. The gal at Pilot Dogs asked us to stay while she led Apache to the back so he wouldn't see us leave first.

About three weeks into the evaluation, they noticed that Apache had a growth plate problem with his hind leg and rather than

risk him or a blind person, he was disqualified. Since Pilot Dogs were the breeders, we had first choice to keep him.

Well, today Apache is not only our housedog but will continue to be the district's spokes dog for Pilot Dogs.

Currently we had or have three puppy raisers in District 13-C and there will be more to come on this issue. Hopefully Lion Terry Bower will become a puppy breeder and soon we will be raising another puppy for Pilot Dogs.

It is nice to think of the dogs as being born into Lions, raised by Lions and becoming the eyes and right hand of a blind person to serve for the rest of their lives.

OHIO LIONS DISTRICT 13C PROPOSAL TO INCORPORATE

A motion was brought before the District 13C cabinet at its August 18th meeting. The motion was to incorporate Lions District 13C. Information was presented on the benefits and reasons why the District, like, clubs, should incorporate. The vote was postponed to provide an opportunity for the cabinet members to review the information and to inform the Lions of District 13C of the issue. The motion will be voted on at the next meeting, November 11, 2004 at Pipers III. The following article presents a brief recap of the discussion:

Because of the litigious nature of our society, a proposal was presented at the August 18, 2004

District 13-2 Cabinet meeting to have the District file incorporation papers with the Ohio Secretary of State. The incorporation procedure involves the preparation of a form (532) by an authorized representative of the District. There is no requirement that the person filing the incorporation documents be a licensed attorney. There is a filing fee of \$125.00 paid with the initial filing. The only other fee involved in the incorporating of the District is a \$25.00 fee every five years submitted with a form of Continued Existence, which also can be filed by any authorized representative of the organization.

The benefit of incorporation of the District is that it gives the District "legal" standing in the courts of the State of Ohio. As it stands today, the District Officers would be held personally responsible for any lawsuits arising from any litigious event, which might occur either at a cabinet meeting, annual convention, or travel for visitation by the District Governor or their representatives.

Incorporation does not create any tax or reporting obligations which the District does not already have as an unincorporated entity, with the exception of the initial filing and filing of continued existence every five years.

Incorporation does not prevent the District from engaging in any enterprises in which it now is engaged or prevent it from

engaging in any new activities authorized under its nonprofit status.
