Today's children are the leaders and citizens of tomorrow. All of us who care

about children must help them become the best they can be in today's world.

Lions-Quest provides comprehensive youth development programs that bring together parents, educators, and community leaders to teach children important life skills within a caring and consistent environment. The programs help children develop the skills that lead to self-discipline, responsibility, good judgment, and the ability to get along with others.

The program provides detailed lesson plans and classroom materials. All of the lessons are designed to complement the standard curricula, offering a variety of ways to teach and reinforce social and academic skills. They also emphasize a strong "no use" philosophy for drugs and teach young people specific strategies for positive, healthy living.

In addition, the programs emphasize service-learning. Students learn important leadership skills by organizing and carrying out school and community projects. Studies have shown that students who are involved in helping out within the community are happier at home, less likely to use alcohol or other drugs, and are more successful in school.

We have the opportunity to schedule a 2-day sponsored workshop within District 13-C to train up to 36 educators at one time. A recent \$25,000 grant from LCIF is helping to conduct workshops around Ohio and "C" can easily be the next location. The Tallmadge Lions Hall has been offered as the facility...all we need now is the commitment from our clubs.

The “Life line” of the Lions organization will be our younger members, especially as some of us age and aren’t physically able to help within our many Lions endeavors.

Our District Governor and my partner in Lions, Governor Marty, is dedicating her year to “Inspiring Youth for Tomorrow’s Leaders”. Whether it’s the revitalization of the *Lions-Quest Program*; providing the *Good Program*; or beginning a *Leo Club* – our clubs can easily help to develop our youth by investing into our community.

I look at my grandchildren and think that it was only yesterday that they began their education and now, they are planning their future while forming their life skills along the way. A Leo Club, or as I think of it – a Junior Lions Club – can begin through the efforts of a church, or a scout troop, a community center and of course, within our local schools via two tracks.

On October 9th the Cleveland Host Lions Club had a Charter Night to celebrate 90 Years of Lionism. PID Lion Steve Sherer was our guest speaker. He spoke of his experiences and travels while being an International Director and noted that everywhere he traveled he saw a common theme, Lions helping others. It always amazes me what Lions can do, from disaster relief to helping people obtain glasses; there is

no limit to what we can do. Each Club is unique and may have made different choices and have different goals, but the same theme runs through them all, SERVICE. I am proud to be a Lion, and I know all of you are, too.

At our Charter Night we inducted two new members out of the three who have joined our Club in the past two months. As Lions we need to grow our Clubs and grow our District by getting out into our communities and recruiting new members. It is so important to keep our organization alive and well in the US where we are seeing the largest decrease in numbers. When the Cleveland Host Lions Club was formed, they had 52 Charter Members. Today, our District only has four Clubs with more than 50 members, and 16 of our Clubs have fewer than 20 members. I would like to encourage each Club to reach out to your communities and look for viable new members. There are many people who don’t know about Lions, but even more who have never been asked to become a Lion. As Lions, we all have a great story to tell about the good work we do, so take a close look at your professional network, identify future Lions, and tell them about your experience as a Lion. In doing so, you will not only grow your club, you will strengthen your own position within your community by revealing yourself as an active participant in a worthy endeavor. When I attended the USA/Canada Forum in

Milwaukee in September, I was amazed by the number of Lions at the event. Standing in line waiting to get into the large banquet hall, I felt like I was in a sea of Lions. There were people from every State, many US Territories, and Canada in attendance. We had 61 Ohio Lions at the Forum, but I was the only one attending from our District. There were so many wonderful sessions being offered, and I only wish that I could have attended them all. The speakers and presenters at the sessions and banquets were awesome. I think the one thing you come away with from this type of event is that there are so many people working together to help others, there is this feeling of oneness for a cause that gets your blood moving. There was an opportunity at one session for people to talk about their fundraising activities. There were lines at both microphones with people willing to share their ideas and their successes, and I look forward to sharing these ideas with you. I also attended a very interesting session on retention that gave insight into clubs losing members. This speaker gave us great hand-outs and material to share with others. As with the fund-raising ideas, I hope to put some of this material into my future articles to share with you. Next year the Forum will be in Alaska, so start planning now and incorporate the trip into an opportunity to see our 49th State. I hear it is beautiful, and it will be a great opportunity for all. If more people from our

District attend, we will be able to cover more sessions and bring back even more useful information to share with our members.

GALEP Report

GALEP ACTIVITIES

Since January 1, 2010, Galep has approved 62 applications and paid for 37 prescription eyeglasses and 7 eye examinations. Since its reorganization GALEP has approved over 72 applications. GALEP has \$108,382 at September 30, 2010.

The revised Code of Regulations and Bylaws was

approved at the October 4, 2010 board meeting.

Lion Bill Hixon of Tallmadge Lions Club has agreed to take over the maintenance of the eyeglass applicant database and Lion Bill Hixon and Shirley Frazier are now reviewing all applications and sending out the appropriate letters for service.

It is the policy of GALEP to pay for eye exams for children which cost \$30. Adults are referred to Summa for eye exams or if the applicant prefers, they may go to Dr. Thomas Adams of Osman Optical and have their eye examination at a cost of \$50.

No surgery financial assistance is being provided at the present time, but may be considered in the future after discussions with Summa and also after the health care reforms now being considered the US Congress are concluded.

The next board meeting of the GALEP Directors is scheduled for December 6, 2010.

Lions Eye Clinic at St. Vincent Charity Medical Center

Eye Exam and Eyeglass Applications

The number of requests for eye examinations and prescription eyeglasses has decreased somewhat over past three weeks. There is now about a 4 week wait between date of application and the receipt of eyeglasses. The program budgets 10 applications per week for service. Club referrals are handled on a first come, first served basis.

Eyeglass Co-Pay Beginning January 1, 2011

The Board of Directors at the September board meeting proposed requiring a \$10 non refundable deposit by all recipients for prescription eyeglasses. This proposal was submitted and approved by the club delegates at the September delegate meeting.

Reasons for Co-pay:

1.) We have 50 pairs of prescription eyeglasses in our office at St. Vincent, paid for by the Lions which were never picked up by applicants. At an

average cost of \$85, this amounts to \$4,250 in Lions funds which could have been used to provide cataract surgeries or expedite the process of receiving prescription eyeglasses for our needy applicants. It is the opinion of the Board that by requiring a non refundable deposit, it will encourage the applicants to pick up their eyeglasses since they will have \$10 of their money invested in the eyeglasses.

2.) It is also hoped that applicants requesting eyeglass assistance from the Lions will take better care of their eyeglasses since they will have a personal financial investment in the eyeglasses.

3.) It is also hoped that the \$10 co-pay will change the thinking of many applicants with respect to the idea that the eyeglasses are free. Several years ago, we had the word "free" removed from all literature at the clinic. These eyeglasses are not "free". The hard work of many Lions raised the money used to provide these eyeglasses.
