International President's Letter

Dear Club Officers,

Lions don't just change – Lions change for the better! When it comes to increasing our ability to serve the people of our communities and the world, nothing should be beyond the scope of our imagination.

Fortunately, it doesn't usually take outlandish ideas to yield great improvements. Lions Clubs around the world have found that one of the biggest boosts in their ability to serve comes from the energizing effect of women members. All around the world, women have rallied around the "We Serve" motto and helped their clubs live up to the ideal it represents.

On a recent visit to India it was my pleasure to meet members of the newly chartered Chennai Aristocrats Lions Club. The 20 forward-thinking Lions who formed this club recognize that the seven women in their ranks have brought a "new dimension" to their service initiatives. They report that their efforts are now focused on some of the most pressing needs of their community – children's issues and improved health for all.

In just three months the club has undertaken major projects including building a water-treatment facility to provide clean water to schools, the creation of a yoga center for the entire community and the "adoption" of a neighborhood in need of better sanitation, hygiene and education. Women are in the forefront of these projects says Club Secretary C.G Balaji. He notes that as a side benefit, the club's meetings have become more interesting and the menu has even improved – because the women insisted upon it!

He says that the women's "participation is a welcome sign and will change the perception

of Lionism, among both Lions and the general public.

I am happy to report that Lions' excellent response to the Challenge to Change is reaping rewards throughout the entire International Association of Lions Clubs. As you may know, the December worldwide membership report has historically shown a decrease from the July 1 total. Thanks especially to clubs' efforts to diversify their membership; this year the totals will be almost equal. That means 5,000 fewer Lions lost to the association! Congratulations to all clubs that have embraced the Challenge to Change and received the benefit of renewed energy and commitment.

In response to the changing needs of Lions, there will be changes made at International Headquarters as well. The Public Relations Division has embarked on a major redesign of the Lions Clubs International Web site and improvements to The LION magazine. In fact, you may be one of the Lions randomly selected to receive a survey questionnaire about the Web site. If you or a member of your club receives one, please help the hardworking staff at International Headquarters by returning it as soon as possible. They need your input! Redesigning the Web site is such a large and complex job that it may take the better part of a year to complete, but changes in The LION magazine will be phased-in over the coming year.

To keep up with clubs' fast-paced recruiting of new members, the club records staff is also making changes. This too, will require the cooperation of Lions, especially club secretaries. WMMR filings will now be due by the last day of each month from clubs that file electronically and by the 20th of each month from clubs that file by mail. This will allow the staff to eliminate the current one month lag between filing and the production of reports and provide current data to all parts of the association. Lions Clubs -Gambling and Fund Raising in the State of Ohio **Lion Neil Sheeley**

Certain forms of gambling are permitted in the state of Ohio for the purpose of raising funds for charitable and civic purposes by qualified tax exempt organizations.

Gambling is regulated by the Ohio Attorney General's office and the regulations are covered

under Section 2915 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Qualified Charitable and Civic Organizations

An organization which has received tax exemption under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(a) and is described under Sections 501(c)(3)(charitable organizations) or under Section 501(c)(4)(civic organizations).

Schemes of Chance

Include slot machines, lotteries, numbers games but NOT BINGO.

Schemes of chance are illegal in the state of Ohio.

Games of Chance

Includes poker, craps, roulette or any other game engaged in by persons giving something of value in hopes of gain and whose outcome is largely dependent upon chance, Bingo is NOT considered a game of chance.

Games of chance may be conducted by permit or license and must comply with the following:

Organization must be a 501(c)(3) charitable organization

May not include craps or roulette for money

Must be held at "festival" which include 2 or more non-gaming activities

Include card games such as "Texas Hold Em" tournaments

May be conducted by the charitable organization twice a year if the event is of 4 days or once a year if the event is 5 days

Must be conducted by volunteers who may not receive any form of compensation

All persons playing or working must be 18 years of age or older

Instant Bingo

Instant bingo may be conducted by license obtained from the Attorney General of Ohio.

The fees for the license run between \$500 to \$5,000 and a percentage of the gross profit.

The charitable organization must comply with following:

Organization must be a 501(c)(3) charitable organization

Instant Bingo (Cont'd.)

License must be obtained from the Attorney General of Ohio

Must be run by volunteers and no person may receive any form of compensation

Very strict record keeping and reporting requirements at both the state and federal level

Traditional Bingo

Traditional bingo may be conducted by license obtained from the Attorney General of Ohio

The license fee range from \$250 to \$5,000 plus a percentage of the gross profit

The charitable or civic organization must comply with the following:

Organization must be a qualified 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) organization

Must obtain bingo license from Attorney General

If a civic 501(c)(4) organization, 100% of the net profits of the fund raiser must be donated to a charitable 501(c)(3) organization.

All persons playing or working must be 18 years of age or older

Very strict record keeping and reporting requirements at both the state and federal level

Raffles

Raffles are a form of bingo where prizes are won by purchasing a ticket.

No license or fees are required to conduct a raffle for a charitable or civic fund raising purpose.

May be conducted by a charitable 501(c)(3) organization or a civic 501(c)(4)

Organization

If conducted by other than a charitable 501(c)(3) organization, at least 50% of the NET

profits must be distributed to a charitable 501(c)(3) organization.

Local law enforcement personnel are responsible for enforcing the laws regarding raffles as opposed to state and federal personnel who enforce other forms of gambling.

All persons working or playing must be 18 years of age or older

Pools

A scheme in which the participants give money for a chance to win a prize and the TOTAL amount of amount wagered is distributed to a participant or participants.

No license or fees are required
Must not be conducted for profit

Summary

As a result of real and perceived abuses in charitable gambling in the state of Ohio, the Ohio

legislature enacted, in 2004, much more stringent gambling regulations, especially with respect to Instant Bingo. The unintended consequences of this legislation were to place severe restrictions on those groups and organizations which utilized gambling in order to raise funds to provide assistance to those in need as well as provide for civic improvements which all local governments rely upon as an adjunct to normal city, village and town services.

As a result of the revised gambling regulations, it is important that each club review its existing fund raising programs and decide at the club level whether continuing the program is a serious problem with respect to the revised regulations. In most cases, the amounts of funds raised are small and generally the net profits are utilized for charitable purposes and the most that may occur, if in violation of the revised gambling rules, is a warning to discontinue the fund raising activity.

It is very important to maintain complete and accurate records should a problem arise.

LCIF UPDATE From PIP Jimmy Ross

CSFII Surpasses Goal

Campaign SightFirst II has surpassed the \$150 million minimum goal. On Worldwide Report Day February 20, National and Multi-National Coordinators' telephone calls and reports revealed that Lions have raised more than US\$157.9 million for CSFII. With four months remaining, Lions are now looking ahead to the additional challenge goal and helping ensure the future of SightFirst through continued and expanded efforts to eliminate preventable blindness worldwide. Lions' support of CSFII is crucial in the remaining months. Visit the [CSFII Web site](#) for more information on the campaign and fundraising ideas.

LCIF #1 NGO Ads Available In a special report released in July, LCIF was ranked the number one non-governmental organization worldwide. From 34 global organizations, LCIF came in first. As a result of the ranking, LCIF has received a great deal of media coverage and has also placed special ads in the New York Times, Wall Street Journal and several other nationwide daily newspapers around the world.

These ads are available to download online for Lions to use in their local newspapers as well. To localize the information, simply add a local telephone number and club Web site. The press release of this announcement is also online to share with your local media.

Milestone in Trachoma Treatments

LCIF reached a major milestone in trachoma treatments January 23 when LCIF Chairperson Jimmy Ross distributed the [10 millionth dose](#) of azithromycin (Zithromax®) to 16-year-old Messeleche Tilahun. The antibiotic, donated by Pfizer Inc, is a main strategy in the fight against the blinding disease in poor, rural areas. Messeleche lives in the Awi Zone in Ethiopia, the most trachoma-endemic part of the country, where an estimated 18 million are at risk. Representatives from The Carter Center, Lions clubs of Ethiopia, Pfizer, the national trachoma program, government of Ethiopia, and other partner organizations joined the celebration and are a part of the coalition working toward elimination of trachoma in the region by 2012. Lions in Ethiopia have been integral to achieving remarkable results in the country. The 10 millionth dose comes after just 18 months of full scale intervention and points toward meeting the elimination target date. Through SightFirst, LCIF has awarded numerous grants for [trachoma control](#), outreach and training projects in Ethiopia and elsewhere in Africa.

SightFirst Grants Awarded

The SightFirst Advisory Committee Meeting [awarded nine grants](#) at its January meeting. This included grant funding to continue the childhood blindness project with the World Health Organization, which has established 30 need-based centers around the world. Other grants included cataract surgery campaigns, upgrading a Lions eye hospital and establishing and equipping a teaching hospital. A total of US\$9,554,378 was awarded, US\$3,580,708 of which represents grants from undesignated SightFirst funds. The full list is available online.

Grants Approved for Lions Quest

[Seven grants](#) totaling US\$364,872 were approved at the January Lions Quest Advisory Meeting. The grants enable Lions Quest programs to expand in countries currently participating in the program or to begin the program in new countries. Japan , Kenya , Canada and Turkey received grants to implement and expand the program. Pakistan and Sri Lanka became the newest countries to launch the program. The full list of approved grants is online.

Lions Join Coalition

Lions Clubs International has joined the Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) as a sustaining

member and partner to enhance the work of local communities and help youth resist alcohol and other drugs. Lions will support their mission to build stronger capacity for anti-drug efforts through the 5,000 community coalitions nationwide. Through Lions Quest, Lions can teach youth how to avoid drugs and make responsible decisions. A letter announcing the partnership was sent to the 500 other organizations in the coalition encouraging these organizations and communities to work with their local Lions club on drug-free programs. LCIF also had a booth at CADCA's annual convention this month, the largest training conference in the U.S. for community coalition activists and substance abuse professionals.

New Giving Publication

A new publication, ForSight in Gift Planning, is available to those Lions wishing to increase their support to LCIF. It provides an overview of various donation programs, news updates and stories of those helped through Lions' contributions.
